**READ TODAY'S DAILY READING HERE**

Dear Parish Family,

Distinctions are quite important in matters of Theology. "Love the sinner; hate the sin" is a distinction pretty much every Catholic hears when growing up in the Church. It teaches us that despising sin is a good thing, but to love those who do sin is Christ-like. It teaches that God loves us even though we choose against his will, but also teaches that such choices offend the author of love. Canon lawyers like myself need to make distinctions in terms of the kinds of laws with which we are dealing. Is this a matter of a priest needing discipline? What was the nature, and level of the offense? Were proper procedures followed?

The most important distinction a canonist, or any Christian, must make, however, is that between Divine law, and disciplinary law. The Church was charged by Christ to profess, hold, and teach Divine laws such as the Ten Commandments, the Golden Rule, and other truths revealed to us in Scripture & Tradition. These are laws given to us by God, and laws that nobody, not even a pope, have the authority to change. In the profession of these truths, however, the Church issues disciplinary laws, or ecclesiastical laws. These laws are, in fact, man-made laws, and *are* changeable by the proper authorities within the Church.

For example, blue is not an approved color for priestly vestments to wear at Mass for any season or day. However, the Church in Spain has a special dispensation for her priests to wear blue vestments on Marian feast days. This is to respect a tradition unique to that culture. The Church could extend the approval of blue vestments to all, or additional countries around the world for the same reason, but she could NOT change our belief of Mary giving birth to Christ as a virgin. Those are truths that were revealed to us by Scripture & Tradition.

Likewise, the Church can, and does apply punishments on priests who commit adultery. The punishments are part of the Church's disciplinary laws. The authority of the Church can change what those punishments are, but the Church has *zero* authority to change the 6th Commandment. The Church cannot make adultery ok. If the distinction between disciplinary, and divine laws are not made when we discuss making positive reforms in the Church, we can start to slip into heresies of faith and morals quickly. Men and women of good faith and reason can respectfully disagree on matters of disciplinary laws, so long as they do follow them in obedience to Church authority, but they may NOT disagree with divine law as it stems from the author of life himself. So, be sure to be certain which is which, and always ask the Holy Spirit to clarify your thoughts in the light of truth.
