Dear Parish Family,

The month of November is especially dedicated by the Church to pray for all souls in Purgatory. There are many misconceptions about the Church's belief in Purgatory, and I will briefly address them here.

1. The Church stopped believing in Purgatory after Vatican II. False. I have no idea how anybody could come to that conclusion after reading the V2 documents. It's an absurd claim.

2. The Church made up Purgatory to raise money. False. This idea stems from the nefarious men and women who would sell indulgences (time out of Purgatory) to naive Christians in order to raise money for themselves, or even for Church projects. This abuse angered many, including Martin Luther who used it as a springboard for his division of the Body of Christ. The belief in Purgatory, however, has always been with the Church. Simple logic would teach us that just because a doctrine is exploited for profit, does not necessitate that that doctrine is false. Many faithful Catholics worked for the abolishment of these abuses within the Church.

3. Purgatory is an "average" place between Heaven and Hell. False. Purgatory is a place where we are purged of any venial sin, or any attachment to sin before we may enter Heaven. This purgation is a period of suffering.

Western theologians usually describe it as suffering through the physical pain of fire, while the Eastern theologians describe it more as a psychological pain of coming to realize the full effects our sins had on others. However that suffering may occur we gradually lose all our desire for sinful things and are then brought to heaven.

4. Purgatory is a permanent destination. False. If you find yourself in purgatory, rejoice for you will someday be in Heaven. Souls in purgatory only move up into Heaven, and never down into Hell.

5. We have no connection to the souls in purgatory. False. Souls in purgatory are souls in the Church. We pray for their duration to be lessened. The greatest way to love our dead is to pray for their eternal rest. I fully understand why we say things like "He's in a better place," in the wake of a death, but never let that sentiment prevent you from offering prayers for the departed. Keep loving your beloved dead by keeping up the prayers for their souls. Remembering death, and the dead may seem morbid to the world, but it is quite the Catholic thing to do. By remembering our own mortality and praying for those who have died our faith in eternal life will actually be strengthened, and our pain comforted. So, pray daily for the dead.
